While questions measure quality of life, they were not developed specifically for people with HD and therefore, they do not cover all of the important aspects that are relevant to individuals with HD.

#### Quality of Life in Caregivers of Traumatic Brain Injury

**Purpose/Goal of the Study** The University of Michigan is leading a multi-site study, TBI-CareQOL, to identify important issues associated with health-related quality of life of caregivers of individuals with traumatic brain injury (TBI). Caregivers (family member/friend who provides physical assistance, financial assistance, and emotional support) of individuals with TBI have been identified as an underserved population in brain injury research.

#### Test-Retest Reliability of HDQLIFE (Huntington Disease Quality of Life) Measures
