History and Etymology for *addiction*

earlier, "inclination, bent," in part derivative of [addict entry 2](#), in part borrowed from Latin *addictiōn-*, *addictiō* "adjudging (of disputed property), assignment of a debtor to the custody of his creditor," from *addicere* "to assign (property), hand over, give up to" + *-tiōn-*, *-tiō*, suffix of action nouns — more at [addict entry 2](#)

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
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
