I was moved by *Hotel Rwanda* but not really shaken this deeply. Not like this. Here is a powerful film."

Based on true accounts from survivors, *Kinyarwanda* provides a stunning example of the power that both religious leaders and ordinary people can wield to defend human rights and demand peace in the face of unspeakable brutality. At the time of the 1994 Rwandan genocide, the Mufti of Rwanda, the most respected Muslim leader in the country, issued a fatwa forbidding Muslims from participating in the killing of the Tutsi. As the country became a slaughterhouse, mosques became places of refuge where Muslims and Christians, Hutus and Tutsis came together to protect each other.

"This film resonates with MPAC and our supporters in a meaningful way," said MPAC President Salam Al-Marayati. "The ultimate message is one of love, peace and forgiveness, which is the foundation of every faith. It's an important example of human beings responding with their best in the face of impossible circumstances."

Following its world premiere at the Sundance Film Festival, *Kinyarwanda* has enjoyed critical acclaim and a growing list of awards, including being nominated for the 2012 NAACP Image Award in Film and TV, and winning the World Cinema Audience Award at AFI Fest. *Kinyarwanda* also received the Voices of Courage and Conscience Award at the 2012 MPAC Media Awards.

"The world reacted too slowly to Rwanda's horror in 1994 and may be unaware of its hopefulness since," said Rick Allen, SnagFilms' CEO. "*Kinyarwanda* is a powerful tale of both horror and hope.
